Merseyside Police Cyber Officers

September 13th 2019 Merseyside Police held a training session for Police Community Support Officers and Local School's Officers who have volunteered to become a Cyber Single Point of Contact. The training included talks about cyber crime, cyber prevent and cyber protect, the aim of the training session was to enable the officers to deliver important cyber related messages in their communities. From the training we have received two prevent referrals from Officers that the Cyber Crime Unit are now working with. Each Cyber Officer has been allocated schools in their area to visit and to offer support to current Cyber Champions and recruit new Cyber Champions for 2020. Cyber Reports

Kik Messaging App Kik is a free instant messaging app available on IOS and Android operating systems owned by Kik Interactive. On 24th September 2019, Kik Interactive announced it would be closing down the messaging service. However within the past week there has been news reports suggesting that the Kik app won't be shutting down after MediaLab decided to invest in the app's future. Kik was first launched in 2010, the app attracted users for its chat feature which enabled users to remain anonymous, users were not required to register with a phone number or personal details, however this feature has contributed to a number of negative factors. The app has appeared in headlines for how child predators have exploited the anonymity feature to contact minors and groom them. It has also been recognised as a high risk app for cyber bullying. Now Kik is here to stay it is an app to definitely be aware of.



Live Streaming Live streaming is a valuable way to connect with the wider community. With popular apps such as Instagram, TikTok, Facebook, YouTube and many more now offering a live streaming feature, young people are live streaming more now than ever before, but it is important that they are keeping themselves safe when using it. People can easily reveal too much personal information about themselves during live streaming, even publishing live videos in their school uniform or from their own bedrooms could give away their identify and personal information. Although live streaming is a harmless feature, it is important to highlight that during live streaming there is no
